

Iwantja artists win big!

Desart wishes to congratulate Vincent Namatjira, Peter Mungkuri, Alec Baker and Iwantja Arts for their incredible achievements in 2017!

This year Vincent was shortlisted for the Ramsay Art Prize, NATSIAA, Archibald, Moran Portrait Prize, and the National Self Portrait Prize – five in total!

Following a sell-out show at Alcaston Gallery, Melbourne, in which Peter and Alec produced collaborative paintings for the first time, the two men were both shortlisted for the NATSIAA. Peter went on to win the Hadley Art Prize (the world's richest prize for landscape art) and Alec was shortlisted for the Adelaide Perry Prize for Drawing.

Tjanpi Desert Weavers features in Songlines: Tracking the Seven Sisters at National Museum of Australia in Canberra

Attempting to tell an Indigenous founding narrative by using Indigenous ways of passing on knowledge within an exhibition space, Songlines: Tracking the Seven Sisters was inspired by an investigative collaboration between senior custodians of Martu country and APY and Ngaanyatjarra lands. Focused artist camps took place with Tjanpi Desert Weavers and the resulting work, Kungkarrangkalnga-ya Parrpakanu (Seven sisters are flying), is a major feature of the exhibition and has been purchased by the National Museum of Australia. Also part of the exhibition are other Tjanpi works – Minyma Punu Kungkarangkalpa (on loan from the Museum of Contemporary Art) and The Seven Sisters (on loan from the Western Australian Museum). Tjanpi Desert Weavers supported the opening of Songlines: Tracking the Seven Sisters by participating in the Artist Residency. Dorcas Tinnimai Bennett from Warakurna (WA) and Yvonne Lewis and Rene Nelson from Irrunytju (WA) hosted weaving workshops and provided demonstrations of their weaving practice for visitors to the exhibition. Songlines runs until 25 February 2018.

After taking out the NATSIAA Work on Paper Prize with this work 'Milkali Kutju – One blood', Robert Fielding has capped off an incredibly successful year with a critically acclaimed series of photographs, in which he has transformed the abandoned, rusted-out cars of the APY lands through painting and long-exposure photography.

"I'm salvaging what belonged to the elders of our communities, throughout the APY Lands and from Indulkana and Mimili ... and bringing these cars to life"

At time of publication, Robert is in Winnipeg, representing Mimili at the First Nations Curators Exchange, a partnership between Australia Council for the Arts, Creative New Zealand, and Canada Council for the Arts. An exchange forum based on art and technology, the exchange program will increase important networks and collaborations and enhance the engagement between international market development and First Nations artists and arts workers.

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Barkly Regional Arts - Exhibition at the 7th Biennale Hors Normes, Lyon

On 27th of September 2017, Barkly Regional Arts opened a major exhibition at the Mairie du 3e Lyon as a component of the 7th Biennale Hors Normes, an international festival celebrating 'outside art' and the diversity of non-academic art practices throughout the world. The exhibition developed from a partnership with La Sauce Singulière, a non-profit arts organisation who developed the festival program.

Georges Bureau, Visual Arts Coordinator at Barkly Regional Arts, delivered a public lecture to accompany the show, featuring over forty paintings and textiles from the communities of Epenarra, Canteen Creek, Mungkarta, Elliott and Tennant Creek. The event was well attended by the public, with city officials and members of the local art scene making an appearance. Feedback was extremely positive, with festival goers drawn to the characteristic 'Barkly' style of the artworks – traditional and contemporary motifs and naïve forms depicting family histories, bush medicines, hunting trips and pastoral life.

A wonderful time was had by all – thanks again to La Sauce Singulière and Mairie du 3e Lyon for having us!
